When Ray's marriage of 23 years fell apart in 2011, Ray fell apart too.

"I started hitting the hard liquor to deal with my pain," he says.

He moved in with his sister to try to move on with his life. But after a while, "She got tired of my drinking and told me I had to leave."

"If not now, then when? If not me, who?"

With no place to go, Ray was suddenly homeless. While out for a walk one Saturday afternoon, a stranger approached him and said, "You look like you're in bad shape. You're going to church with me tomorrow."

Figuring he had nothing to lose, Ray agreed. At church the next morning, he met a guy who was in the 180 recovery program at MorningStar Mission. The man told Ray what a difference the program had made in his life and invited Ray to come along.

So Ray, again figuring he had nothing to lose, said, "Okay." He walked through the doors of the Mission, hoping for a life-changing experience.

And it was . . . for a while. "Then I crashed and burned," he says. He moved back in with his sister, but his drinking was out of control.

So he tried the Mission again. And again he "crashed and burned."

After those two relapses, a staff member from the Mission ran into Ray and suggested he try once more.

"I said, 'Nah, man, I'm not ready for it," Ray remembers. "But I started walking down the street

Helen, a single mom with an 11-year-old daughter, gave up her home and job in Missouri to move to Chicago to help a family member.

But things didn't work out the way she had hoped, and they ended up homeless.

"I didn't know what to do," Helen says. "I'd never been homeless before. A friend told me about MorningStar, and I called and told them about my situation. And they invited us to come."

Since arriving at the Mission early this year, Helen has been working hard to get her life back on track.

She says a typical day includes morning prayers, meetings throughout the day, counseling sessions, and working toward independence. She says the Mission staff does a good job in equipping guests for stepping back out into the world.

"They 100% help us achieve our goals," Helen says. "They give us motivation. They remind us to not give up, to keep going, even during the pandemic."

Once she's ready to move along, Helen intends to go back to college to get her degree as a registered nurse.

"I don't know where I'd be without MorningStar," she says. "They really help us out. I think God led me here for a reason."

Bringing Christmas Joy

Stars of Hope is a gift to struggling families.

A t the end of a difficult year, children deserve to wake up on Christmas morning and find some gifts under the tree. But not all families can afford it.

That's why the Mission's *Stars of Hope* program exists — to ensure that children from low-income families receive Christmas presents. Qualified families can register at MorningStar to receive food baskets for Thanksgiving and Christmas, and to participate in *Stars of Hope*. Over 200 children and 78 families will benefit this year.

"It's an awesome program," says Pam Passolano, who has volunteered with the Mission and *Stars of Hope* for years. "And the whole community is willing to help out by providing gifts. It's amazing how generous people are."

Parents or guardians of children 17 and younger can fill out a form with gift suggestions for their children one a necessity (often clothing) and one just for fun (usually a toy). But some families are so strapped financially that they end up asking for two necessities per child — for example, a pair of shoes and a winter coat.

Each child's wish list becomes a star that donors then adopt. They purchase items from the star and drop them off at the Mission, where families pick up the gifts in plenty of time for Christmas.

Passolano says her entire workplace and her women's Bible study at church get involved, buying gifts for 12 to 15 children every year.

and thinking about it. I thought, *Well, if not now, then when? If not me, who?* So I turned around and I came back to the Mission."

Third time's the charm? Ray thinks so. And with good reason.

"This is my third shot," he says. "But I'm more motivated this time. And here's why: The doctor told me I have cirrhosis of the liver, and that I can't have another drink. He said if I started drinking again, it would kill me." Ray is grateful that the Mission gave him not just a second chance, but a third. That kind of grace and mercy can go a long way toward changing a person.

"If it weren't for the Mission, I'd probably be dead," he says. "But they welcomed me back with open arms. They just said to come on home."
