Christmas was coming, and Tanicka was worried that when her kids woke up on that special day, they wouldn't find much of anything under the tree.

A single mother of three young boys, Tanicka had recently divorced and lost her job, going from a relatively comfortable life to one of uncertainty.

"I was worried I wouldn't be able to provide my kids with much of a Christmas," Tanicka says. "I was worried they would be disappointed."

But that's where you came to the rescue.

Tanicka and her boys had landed at MorningStar Mission, where our annual Stars of Hope program brings joy — and gifts — to struggling families.

Tanicka wasn't sure what to expect when her family turned in their wish lists. "I reminded my boys that they might not get this or that just because they asked for it."

But all three boys — and Tanicka herself — received everything they asked for. Tanicka was overwhelmed.



"People don't have to be that generous," she says.

"They could buy whatever they want, but they provided everything on the wish list."

Her youngest son asked for — and received — PAW Patrol toys. Her middle one got the Avengers action figures he requested. Her oldest got a portable gaming system that he'd hoped for. They also received clothes and shoes.

And Tanicka got the winter coat she wished for, plus a few other items.

No "Santa Thing"

Though young, Tanicka's sons knew there were financial struggles, and they asked where the presents had come from.

"I didn't do the Santa thing," Tanicka says. "I told my boys that other people thought of us and wanted to

At the warehouse, the Mission stores almost anything you could think of that a family would need — clothes for adults and children, toys, school supplies, toiletries and other essentials.

Her favorite part of the job? Interacting with families who receive the Mission's services.

"Meeting families is really nice," Nancy says, "especially seeing the kids get excited around Christmastime.

"MorningStar serves a lot of people who would not normally be able to afford what we're giving them. Parents are often just trying to give their kids a nice Christmas."

Nancy encourages others in the community to join her as a volunteer.

"We can always use help, especially during the holidays," she says. "The families we serve are so appreciative, and it makes you feel really good about what you're doing."

She's on her way already. They've moved out of the shelter and are now renting a house from MorningStar as the next step toward independent living. She's pursuing a nursing degree, and hopes to land a good job after that.

In the meantime, her family is grateful for your Christmas kindness.

"When people land on hard times, it's good to know somebody cares, even though they don't even know us," Tanicka says.

"When I get back on my feet, I will remember where I've been, and I want to do this for somebody else. Thank you!"

"An Awesome Program"

Stars of Hope brightens the holidays for struggling families.

On Christmas morning, children deserve to wake up and find some gifts under the tree. But not all families can afford it.

That's why the Mission's Stars of Hope program exists — to ensure that children from low-income families receive Christmas presents. Qualified families can register at MorningStar to receive food baskets for Thanksgiving and Christmas, and to participate in Stars of Hope. Over 200 children and 78 families will benefit this year.

"Stars of Hope is an awesome program," says Tanicka, a single mother whose family has benefited from the program. "You want your kids to have a nice Christmas, and Stars of Hope does that. We are so grateful."

Everyone who registers for the program gets to make a "wish" list and a "needs" list. Parents or guardians can fill out a form for their children 17 and younger. Parents can also turn in their own lists.

Each list then becomes a star that donors can adopt — red stars for needs and green stars for wishes. Donors purchase items from the star and drop them off at the Mission, where families then pick up the gifts in plenty of time for Christmas.

Tanicka says she and her three young boys have been overwhelmed at the generosity of those who purchase items for Stars of Hope . . . and she makes sure her sons know that it's all made possible by the kindness of strangers.
